The Iceberg Analogy of Culture






Surface Culture

10% is what we can see Food, fashion, art, language, dance, etc.


Deep Culture

90% is what we cannot see Attitudes, beliefs, history, communication styles and rules, etc.



- Build relations with the local people
- Network with other expatriates

The D.I.V.E model

During your exchange you will meet with new and sometimes confusing experiences. One method for handling difficult situations in an intercultural context is known as the D.I.V.E model:



- Describe describe in an objective way
- Interpret interpret the situation; what do you think may have happened?
- Verify verify with others what they think; are there several different interpretations?
- Evaluate evaluate the situation based on your results
